MINISTER'S LETTER

Dear Friends, I wish you every blessing in 2026. May the days ahead be full of spiritual refreshment, Christian witness, and living hope.

It is not everyone who can read the news or view the world with confidence. Many things which are beyond our control seem to be going badly. A Scottish election in the next few months will give us all the chance to cast our vote – but maybe not even political power, at local, national or international level, is enough to make a difference.



But our trust is in a higher authority, and so we also cast our votes with prayer. We may not know what God is doing, but we are learning to trust him. The unpredictable words and actions of Jesus that surprise us in the Gospels, where so many were blessed, continue through the faithful following of those who belong to his church today.

Christmas was full of good things in Ness Bank. I am grateful to the many who catered, decorated, sang, played, acted, printed, delivered and welcomed people into our midst. "Watoto" is the Swahili word for children, and the choir consists of children touring the UK to bring hope and healing to vulnerable woman and children in Uganda and Sudan through this work of Christian mission. The entertainment will be lively, and the cause is good, so I hope you will be able to come along and give your support.

Then our thoughts will turn to Easter, with another opportunity to open our church during the week to visitors. In the past, the numbers coming in have been encouraging, and their response has been inspiring. But the work of welcome has fallen on the shoulders of a small number of faithful volunteers. Perhaps there is someone reading this

today who could step forward and share in that work. All it needs is a cheerful smile, a few spare hours, and a little courage. And if you haven't done it before, we'll make sure you do it with someone who has. Who knows? Perhaps this could be an exciting new adventure for you.

In fact, that will be true for us all this year, no matter what our plans are. It has been said the only things we can be sure of are Death and Taxation! But I would add to that list both Unexpected Change, and God! Let us trust him who has paid our debts, to guide us through our use of the gifts he has given us, and prepare us for the life after death that awaits all those who believe in Jesus Christ as Lord.

The all-age Nativity service on 14th December, included our very own 'angel' Gabriel from Luwero, Uganda, and drew folk from across the congregation to play their parts in celebrating God's gift of Jesus, the light and hope of the world. On 21st, the choir played their part along with various readers, in exploring all the

different ways that the angels were involved in the story, and reminding us that the goal of all history is to join with the angelic host in worshipping our Lord, the King of Kings and Lord of Lords.

The second Inverness Churches Together Carol Crawl took place on Monday 22nd December, and the weather was very kind to us, so that nearly 200 people shared in worship across the 6 different churches along the riverbank. We enjoyed the variety of styles of music, prayer and readings, and especially enjoyed the refreshments provided for all at Trinity Life where the crawl came to a happy conclusion.

On Christmas Eve, a significant number of visitors joined members of the congregation to bring in the day itself, with a short service following some community carols introduced by Margaret Livingstone. We enjoyed warm fellowship in spite of the failure of the upstairs heating system!



And on Christmas Day, since the heating was still not functioning, the service moved at short notice to the hall, where we were toasty warm, and shared the joy of Christ's birth, learning a new song to the tune of 'The Twelve Days of Christmas', which helped us to think of the immense significance of that event. Special appreciation is due to both our minister, and to the sound team on duty that day for managing a last-minute relocation so smoothly!

A visit from Gabriel

In May, 2025, our minister, Stuart Smith, made his annual visit to Uganda, to take part in teaching at the Luwero Pastors and Teachers Conference. In December, the leader of the ministry in Luwero – Bishop Gabriel Kijjambu – visited Ness Bank, sharing in our nativity service, bringing greetings and sharing the story of the ministry since its inception in 2002.

Gabriel's story is inspiring, and gives us cause for great rejoicing, as there is now a strong church in the village, and a Christian witness to the community through the schools, clinic, bible college, and the work of the farms which help to provide food for the students. Uganda is a nation of young people, and the need to reach them with the good news of Jesus, and to equip them with skills and education, is very great. It is a privilege to partner with Gabriel and his family in this work, by our prayers and by giving if we so wish. In addition to running all the various activities, the ministry enables sponsorship of individual children who might otherwise miss out on education. Familiar Faces in Ness Bank

This month we hear from - Stuart Black



I have been attending Ness Bank Church for over 50 years. The first time was when my Dad, Archie, preached as sole nominee in 1974 and I was 10 years old. When the congregation was asked to vote I stood up too! Church played a big role in my school years in Inverness. On Monday evening there was a badminton club, Wednesday (Juniors) then Friday (Seniors) was Boys' Brigade, on Saturday evening there was a youth club and Sunday was Sunday School and later the Kirk Youth Group. I remember great teachers like Rob Gourlay and Bill Arthur in the youth group and lots of stories about Snoopy and singing with Bob's guitar in Church House. I played a lot of football when I was younger for the school in the morning, then the 2nd Company BBs on Saturday afternoon. I usually didn't have time to wash between matches so would have quite a muddy bath on Saturday evening! I really enjoyed being in the BB's and was one of the first boys in the company to get the Queens Badge, its highest achievement. The photo is from 1981 and shows my colour sergeant uniform and Queen's Badge certificate.

After studying Geography at Edinburgh University, I decided to do a PhD at Glasgow University. It was partly funded by the Highlands and Islands

Development Board as I was interested in how to make the Highlands more successful and help retain young people. There were HIDB employees in Ness Bank like Keith Farquarson and I was very interested in their work. I submitted my doctorate in late 1989 and graduated in July 1990.

In 1996, after a spell working in London followed by 6 years as a lecturer in Land Economy at Aberdeen University, I got a job with Highlands and Islands Enterprise, the successor to the HIDB, back in Inverness. My career there was very interesting and in 2002 I became Chief Executive of the enterprise company for Inverness and Nairn. After 12 years with HIE I moved to Highland Council as Director for Planning and Development. By now I was an elder at Ness Bank with 3 daughters who went to Girls Brigade and the Sunday School and KYG. I also helped run the KYG for many years with Keith Gibson.

In 2020 I moved back to a job with HIE and in January 2022 became its Chief Executive. In this role I meet lots of senior business and community leaders and politicians. I never forget the grounding I had growing up in Inverness and Ness Bank Church. I now also chair Inverness Foodstuff which helps people who are in need in Inverness as I want to give back to the church and community which has given me so much. I know my most important role is as a parent and this August I was delighted to become a grandad to Aaron, Iona and Tony's son, who live in Edinburgh. The picture is of the two of us.



Spring 2026



This mini-booklet is designed for you to pull out of the church newsletter and keep, so that you can use it in the coming weeks to assist you in bible reading and in prayer.

There's nothing like the written word of God for showing you the way to salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. Every part of scripture is God-breathed and useful one way or another – showing us truth, exposing our rebellion, correcting our mistakes, training us to live God's way. Through the word we are put together and shaped up for the tasks God has for us.

(2 Timothy 3.15-17, the Message paraphrase)

'Here's what I want you to do: Find a quiet, secluded place so you won't be tempted to role-play before God. Just be there as simply and honestly as you can manage. The focus will shift from you to God, and you will begin to sense his grace.

The world is full of so-called prayer warriors who are prayer-ignorant. They're full of formulas and programmes and advice, peddling techniques for getting what you want from God. Don't fall for that nonsense. This is your Father you are dealing with, and he knows better than you what you need.

With a God like this loving you, you can pray very simply. Like this:

Our Father in heaven, reveal who you are, set the world right; do what's best – as above, so below. Keep us alive with three square meals. Keep us forgiven with you and forgiving others. Keep us safe from ourselves and the Devil. You're in charge: You can do anything You want! You're ablaze in beauty!

These headings and suggestions are to help you pray for our church, our family, our world, and above all, to pray that God will build his kingdom. Please use them in any way that suits. There are significant spaces between each section in case you want to note particular items for prayer.

The Psalms are the song-, and prayer-book of God's children, where we find words for our deepest need. We can learn from them how to pray for ourselves.. in this example, we learn how prayer can be a simple expression of thanksgiving and delight – a sharing with God of our deep awareness of his love, and affirmation of our trust.

The Lord is my shepherd, I shall not be in want.

When we take time to consider just who it is that we are praying to, lifting our minds to contemplate His greatness, His goodness, His eternal love, then we gain a good perspective on ourselves and our situation, and are reminded that He can be trusted.

He makes me lie down in green pastures, he leads me beside quiet waters, he restores my soul.

This God, the One who appoints himself as our shepherd, has all the resources to meet our needs and knows exactly what they are. As we deliberately recall his goodness and abundant grace toward us, we are encouraged to trust him for our current situation, whatever it may be.

He guides me in paths of righteousness for his name's sake.

God's care for me depends not on my deserving of it, but on the character of God himself – he will not be dishonoured by failing to provide for his own beloved, but will be glorified and exalted when it is seen just how faithful He is to keep his promises. We can utterly depend upon them, and can rejoice in how tightly we are held in his love.

Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me.

The psalmist has moved from talking about God ('He'), to talking directly to God ('You).. did you notice? There is a profound relationship of trust here, a trust grounded in God's past faithfulness and unfailing love for the writer. In his time of crisis, the truth about God which the writer has been recounting becomes the basis for his personal appeal and

dependence. I come in prayer, not to someone who is merely a name to me, but to the One who knows and loves me best of all, and who invites me to trust utterly in his constant presence. Because of my saviour, Jesus, I am the beloved child of God, and I am invited – even in the darkest shadows - to rest, to delight in my Father's love and care for me.

You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies. You anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows.

I am invited, with the psalmist, to revel in God's goodness and to believe that even the presence of my enemies is no bar to his work in me and for me. I can pray with serene confidence in all circumstances, because God has abundantly provided for me, and promised good to me through Jesus.

Surely goodness and love will follow me all the days of my life, and I will dwell in the house of the Lord for ever.

The Lord who is our shepherd is also the master of the house wherein we are promised a home. In this life, that home is the fellowship of God's people and the free access which we have as believers into God's presence. There is so much to give thanks for here! Because of Jesus, God makes his home even now among us and we dwell with him today. That in itself is cause for rejoicing, but we know that when this life is past, we enter a nearer and new life in God's presence, where nothing can come between us and our Loving Shepherd, and all the troubles and grief of this life are past. Thanks be to God, for He is good, and His love endures for ever!

Prayer Prompts

The bible teaches very clearly that we can, and should, be prayerful at all times, continually sharing our lives, burdens and joys with our Heavenly Father, and seeking his power, guidance and glory in our world. But it can be helpful to have specific prayer habits – perhaps different topics on different days of the week, and this quarterly prayer diary will use that format to cover a range of things we can be praying for.

Sundays

As we share in worship with our family at Ness Bank, we can pray for our fellow believers across Inverness in their various congregations. Pray that God would pour out his Spirit on our city, so that people will be stirred up to seek God. Pray that believers would be eager to share their faith and to speak simply and effectively of what Jesus has done. Pray especially for the congregation at the Junction Church, as they mourn the death of their leader Owen Morris, and support his wife Kate (who is also in leadership) and their family.

We can also pray for worshipping communities across Scotland, as they meet for fellowship and then scatter into their neighbourhoods to serve, pray and witness to Jesus. Our land needs to see the light, to know the healing and forgiveness that comes only through Christ.

Mondays

Scripture Union Scotland has a diverse and rich ministry to school children and young people in our country. Pray for those who lead groups in schools, that they might have wisdom and perseverance; pray for the witness of Christian pupils, who face ridicule, rejection, and a hostile environment; pray that our children and young people would encounter Jesus through the bible, and through other Christians, so that they find hope and purpose in life, and know forgiveness and healing.

Pray for those who are developing resources for schools and youth groups, addressing difficult issues in light of the truth of God's love and purpose for his creation. Pray for the preparation now underway for the 2026 residential events and holiday clubs which will take place from Easter onwards. Pray that God would prepare the hearts of each child who will attend, and that the leaders and helpers would have courage and strength for the task!

Tuesdays

Bishop Gabriel Kijjambu visited Ness Bank in December, and shared with us about his work in Kiryanyonza village, Luwero, Uganda. Let's take time to thank God for this ministry, for Gabriel's strength, wisdom and humble service to his community. Pray for ongoing wisdom in developing the work, in recruiting staff and investing time and resources well. Pray for the word of God to be handled wisely and well in the many churches within Gabriel's diocese of Luwero, where pastors often have little formal training. Pray for protection from the dangerous 'prosperity gospel' teaching, which is so damaging to believers. Praise God for all those who profess faith in Jesus today in that part of our world!

Uganda had presidential elections in January, and political tensions are very high. Pray for stability in the country, so that people might live in peace, and that the gospel might be shared without fear.

Wednesdays

It sometimes seems that our world is more unstable and unpredictable than ever – and while humanly speaking there is much uncertainty - we as believers have confidence in the Almighty God, who is on the throne and whose purposes for his creation will be fulfilled. So we pray for world leaders to become conscious of their responsibilities to act justly; we can pray for them to be convicted of their own need for salvation.

We can also give thanks that in spite of what looks frightening, our God remains sovereign over all. Pray that those who work for peace would find favour with warring powers; pray that God will restrain evil and promote mercy, justice and compassion.

Thursdays

There remain many people groups, languages and cultures in our world where there is no living gospel witness, no known believers. There are places where sharing Jesus is very dangerous, and where learning about him, having access to a bible or other resources is very difficult. And so we pray, giving thanks for all the many agencies by which the bible is being made available, and the good news brought to the ends of the earth. Pray for ongoing bible translation work through agencies like Wycliffe; for literacy and education projects which enable people to read for themselves. Pray for creative outreach mission work in countries where no missionaries are allowed to enter; and for courage for native believers in those lands to step out in faith, taking risks to meet and encourage one another.

Fridays

Our God is in the business of bringing the dead to life; of healing and transforming brokenness and of bringing wholeness where there has been desolation and emptiness. Our land desperately needs this kind of change; life-by-life, we long to see people brought into the knowledge of their place as God's beloved children; to see addiction broken by the presence in their hearts of something more powerful and attractive than the strongest temptation; to see relationships healed and to see families thrive. God has called us, his church, to be his presence and the channel of his loving power to the world – what are we doing to obey that call? Prayer is a good place to start. Pray that God will help us to love as he loves, to see each human being as his precious child; to care as God cares. Pray against addiction, and pray for opportunities in your own life to speak of Jesus, our hope and our salvation.

Nothing is impossible for God, no-one is beyond his mercy and grace. Pray against pride and the independent spirit which resists his invitation, and ask our loving Father to show his power in our land, in our city, by bringing many to Christ.

Saturdays

There are many in the world of sport and entertainment who profess Christian faith, and who consequently are held to the highest standards by the unbelieving world around them. Pray for those in our public realm – sport, media, and also politics – who are faithful followers of Jesus. Pray that they would be wise, that they might be strong against temptations, and humble enough to know when they need help. Pray that their witness might bear fruit, and they will be encouraged to see that God has purposes to use them in their communities and in the public realm.

There is always a warm welcome and a friendly vibe at the Cosy Café but this week there was a party atmosphere when one of our regulars brought his guitar to lead a sing-song after the meal. The café is open on a Monday at the Bught Stop, Torvean Avenue, next to the Bught Park Shop, from 12.30 until

2.30pm. serving soup, sandwiches, scones and traybakes. Take-aways are also available. Each week we offer a warm space and good food to a regular group of around 15-20 folk. There is no charge but a donation box is available if anyone is able to contribute.



Originally the café was a joint venture with the local Ballifeary Community Council. When our parish boundary was altered to include the Bught area, Rev. Penelope Smirthwaite, whose remit included community outreach on the west side of our parish, looked at the café as a good place for Ness Bank to become involved in the area and a few church members volunteered to help out alongside local residents.

Unfortunately, the Community Council is disbanded at present, so Ness Bank has now taken the lead in this project. This is possible thanks to the Hector Gordon Russell Trust,

which previously funded our Wednesday lunch club, and support from Highland Council who provide the premises and utilities free of charge.

A small group of eight volunteers run the café on a rota system but more are always welcome! Only four are required each week and the project runs from October until the end of April so it is not a huge commitment. Perhaps you might like to join the team? SANCTUARY

Our plans to develop the Sanctuary at Ness Bank have taken two significant steps forward. Permission has been given – Planning and Listed Building Consent, and the approval of the General Trustees of the Church of Scotland. And Money has been given – the General Trustees also approved our grant request for £340,000.

Taken together with funding already in place – from our Reserves, our “Giving and Sharing” appeal to the Congregation, and our allocation of a Legacy – that means we now have access to around 70% of the projected cost of almost £1.2 million.

As 2026 begins, we now move on to the next stage of the design process. That involves our working group on the building meeting with LDN Architects and their advisors to do the detailed design work required for Building Control approval and Tender. We have allowed six months for that, during which time further applications for grants are being submitted. When the design work is complete, the Tenders are in, and the money is in place, we will be ready to begin.

We plan to keep the building in use as much as possible while the work is taking place – but there will inevitably be some disruption. So please be prepared to use different rooms or entrances when the time comes, and to cope with some temporary changes.

It is worth emphasizing the aim of the planned changes. We hope not only to make the Sanctuary more comfortable for its existing use – better access and improved decoration – but also to open it to the wider public on a regular basis. That is why we have included a new kitchen in the Vestry area of the church, and a new Servery in the Sanctuary – to offer hospitality, and generate income to pay for the staffing that regular opening will require. With this new purpose – regular Christian welcome, witness and worship – we believe the long-term place of the building in the centre of Inverness is guaranteed. That is also the part of the vision which is most likely to attract the external funding the project needs.

Please continue to pray for people and plans as we make progress.
